Since 2016 Fischer is Associated Director for Economic Cooperation of the CEA-PME Confédération Européenne des Associations de Petites et Moyennes Entreprises

Fischer earned his PhD in 1984 from the Ruhr-Universität of Bochum in Germany, with a thesis on international law and the use of nuclear weapons. In 1988, he co-founded the Institute for International Law of Peace and Armed Conflict at the Ruhr - University Bochum, Germany (IFHV), where he served as its Academic Director for almost three decades. Fischer regularly provided counsel to various national and international humanitarian organizations, including the ICRC, UN organizations, national ministries and courts, international bodies, and associations of companies. He was one of the lead experts who drafted the ICRC customary law study as well as the German Code of Crimes against International Law. His approximately 100 publications include articles, books, and book contributions on international law and international politics, such as disarmament, humanitarian issues, disaster response, human rights, international crimes, diplomatic relations, use of air and space, and international development. Fischer acted as lead editor and co-editor of a humanitarian law yearbook and human rights book series with Cambridge University Press and as editor of international law and humanitarian law journals with German publishers.

Among the honors and awards he received are the Order of Merit of the Federal Republic of Germany 1st Class, a Medal of Honor for Training the Federal Brazilian Prosecutors, and the Special Prize of the Rectors' Conference of the Federal Republic of Germany for his achievements in setting up innovative international educational programs.
